



NJ Hospital To Launch Acute Alcoholic Steatohepatitis Treatment Trial

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The Capital Health Center for Digestive Health in New Jersey is currently enrolling patients in a clinical trial studying a new treatment method for acute alcoholic steatohepatitis (ASH), NJ.com reports. The hospital's Center for Liver Disease will be conducting Phase III trials for an extracorporeal liver assist device (ELAD), a new bio-artificial cell therapy, in which doctors allow a patient's liver to regenerate on its own to a more stable condition until a transplant is possible. In previous trials, the ELAD method has been shown to increase survival rates in patients with acute liver failure and, in some cases, avoid unnecessary liver transplants.
