*He opened the front door, then stopped in his tracks. "Wait one moment!" he said, and ran back into the house. He came back with a large yellow sticky note on which he had inscribed a big capital C with a black marker. Then he place it on my chest, over my heart.*

*"What's this?" I asked. "It's C for Courage. You've got courage, Joni. I can see it in your eyes. You're going to make it today. You're going to do it, and I am praying for you. You've got the courage of Christ."*

She continues to explain how pain, difficulty and the disability she faces everyday reminds both of them *that courage doesn't flow from our own reservoirs of strength and character, but from the living Christ who makes His home within us.*

She adds, *"The best courage in times of crisis isn't the kind we siphon out of the tepid, shallow pools at the bottom of our soul. For one thing, that courage will never last! The best courage is the kind that has been channeled from heaven itself--a vast reservoir wider than the human mind can conceive."*

I wholeheartedly agree. Jesus supplies courage beyond compare. We can do all things through Christ who gives us strength. His strength is perfect. I for one am so thankful I have him to rely on, aren't you?

If you haven't asked him lately, I hope you call out to him today to give you His courage and strength.
